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AMENDMENTS TO THE TRINIDAD AND TOBAGO RACING AUTHORITY

ACT CHAPTER 21:50 RULES MADE BY THE RACING AUTHORITY UNDER SECTION 17 OF THE TRINIDAD AND TOBAGO RACING AUTHORITY ACT

THE TRINIDAD AND TOBAGO RACING AUTHORITY RULES, 2020 (Amended as at August 1st 2020)

Rule 30. Disqualification of horses

(3) Where a horse has been the subject of an examination under these Rules and the result of an analysis of any sample of its tissue, body fluid or excreta is positive, the horse will be liable to disqualification and loss of purse in accordance with the provisions of Rule 104 A and B. Any horse which returns a positive sample shall be debarred from taking entry for a period of thirty (30) days, unless the Authority determines otherwise. The Authority further reserves the right, in its discretion, to debar the horse from taking entry to race for such further period of time in excess of thirty (30) days after the return of a positive sample.

Rule 102. (B) Approved Therapeutic medication

The following list of substances have been identified as having accepted therapeutic use in the horse and as such the Official Primary Laboratory for the purpose of identifying a sample as positive will be guided by the screening limits as listed next to the name of the therapeutic substance.

<u>UPDATED PUBLIC STATEMENT OF THE REGULATED INDUSTRIES</u> <u>COMMISSION 2022</u>

In compliance with sections 7, 8, and 9 of the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) 1999

In accordance with Sections 7, 8 and 9 of the Freedom of Information Act ("FOIA") the Regulated Industries Commission ("the Commission") is required by law to publish the following statement, which lists the documents that are available to the public.

The FOIA gives members of the public:

- 1. A legal right for each person to access information held by the Commission;
- 2. A legal right for each person to have official information relating to him/her amended where it is incomplete, incorrect or misleading;
- 3. A legal right to obtain reasons for adverse decisions made regarding applicant's request for information under the FOIA;
- 4. A legal right to complain to the Ombudsman and to apply to the High Court for Judicial Review to challenge adverse decisions made under the FOIA.

Section 7 (1) (a) (i)

Function and structure of the Regulated Industries Commission

Mission statement:

The Mission Statement of the Regulated Industries Commission is to:

To ensure promotion of the highest quality of utility services at fair and reasonable rates while building a credible regulatory regime that responds adequately to stakeholders' concerns and also ensure fairness, transparency and equity in the provision of utility services throughout the country.

The RIC is a statutory body established by Act No. 26 of 1998 ("the RIC Act") to regulate and monitor the operations of the service providers named in the RIC Act. The RIC replaced the Public Utilities Commission ("PUC") whose jurisdiction was issued under the PUC Act Chap 34:01, which was repealed under the RIC Act. The service providers that presently fall under the purview of the RIC Act include:

- The Water and Sewerage Authority ("WASA")

- The Trinidad and Tobago Electricity Commission ("T&TEC")
- The Power Generation Company of Trinidad and Tobago ("PowerGen")
- Trinity Power Limited (formerly InnCogen Limited).

The Commission as duly constituted consists of a Chairman, Deputy Chairman and at least three (3) other members. The total composition of the Commission shall not consist of less than five (5) or more than seven (7) members, appointed by the President for a maximum of five (5) years at any one time. The RIC Act also provides for an Executive Director.

The RIC Act makes provision for the establishment of Consumer Services Committees, members of which are appointed by the Minister and will consist of a Chairman, a representative nominated by the Tobago House of Assembly and three (3) other members who will serve as consumer advocates. Such committees will advise the Commission on matters related to quality of service delivered and ensure that complaints procedures of service providers produce speedy resolutions for consumers. They may also be required to contribute to deliberations of the Commission where rates and licence conditions come under review.

The role of the Commission under the RIC Act includes:

- Making Recommendations to the Minister on the award of licences.
- Monitoring and enforcing compliance with licence conditions and imposing penalties for non-compliance.
- Prescribing and monitoring standards of services.
- Establishing the principles on which tariffs will be based and conducting periodic reviews of rates.
- Conducting studies of efficiency and economy of operation and performance by service providers.
- Investigating consumer complaints and facilitating relief in respect of rates, billing and unsatisfactory service.
- Facilitating competition among service providers, where desirable.
- Collection of Licence fees.

The functions of the Commission are discharged by a complement of thirty – nine (39) members of staff of the Commission.

Staff serves as a support arm of the Commission by functioning in furtherance to the mandate of the Commission. See organizational structure of the Commission.

The office of the Commission is located on the 1^{st} and 2^{nd} Floors of the Commission's offices situate at #88 Queen Street, Port-of-Spain.

Effect of Functions on Members of the Public

Through the operations of the RIC, the public's interest is protected by the Commission ensuring:

• Maximum efficiency in the allocation and use of resources and that services are provided at the lowest cost

If we cannot make a legible copy of a document to be released, we may not attempt to reconstruct it. Instead, we will furnish the best copy possible and note its quality in our reply.

Please note we are not compelled to do the following:

- (a) Create new documents. For example, we are not required to write a new program so that a computer will print information in the format you prefer.
- (b) Perform research for you.

Time Limits

• General

The FOIA sets a time limit of thirty (30) calendar days for determination of your request for access to documents. If it appears that processing your request may take longer than the statutory limit, we will acknowledge your request and advise you of its status. Since there is a possibility that requests may be incorrectly addressed or misdirected, you may wish to call or write to confirm that we have received the request and to ascertain its status.

• Time Allowed

We will determine whether to grant your request for access to information as soon as practicable but no later than 30 days as required by Section 15 of the FOIA. If a decision is taken to grant access to the information requested, you will be permitted to inspect the documents and/or be provided with copies.


